PERSEVERENCE

Do you remember Steve Jobs, founder of the MacIntosh Computer? He studied Zen Buddhism and often held discussions with Shunryu Suzuki, the great Zen teacher, on the topic of the "Beginner's Mind". It refers to having an attitude of openness, eagerness, and lack of preconceptions when studying a subject, even when studying at an advanced level, just as a beginner in that subject would.

Jobs also lived by a quote from a publication called <u>The Whole Earth Catalog</u>, and on the back cover is a picture of an early morning country road and beneath it were the words, "Stay Hungry, Stay Foolish."

Steve Jobs in his message to graduating seniors at Stanford University related 3 stories that described how he lived his life. I will relate one of them to you. This one is about "connecting the dots." An adopted child, whose biological mother insisted that the adoptive parents give him a college education, dropped out because he could not find any value in the classes he was taking. But, he hung around and finally enrolled in a calligraphy class, realizing that it had no practical application in his life. Ten years later, as he was designing the Mac computer, it all came back to him and used what he learned in that class for all his typography. Had he not taken that class, the Mac would never have the multiple typefaces or proportionally spaced fonts. Of course, he said it was impossible to connect the dots at that time, but was very clear to him 10 years later. So you have to trust the dots will connect in the future. You have to trust in something. This approach has never let him down. The second is about love and loss. He started Apple in his parent's garage with a friend and in 10 years it grew into a 2 billion dollar company with 4000 employees.

They had just released their finest creation, the Mac, and then got fired after a disagreement with a partner. That was the best thing that happened to him. It freed him to what he called the best creative period in his life. He started a company called NeXT, then another one called Pixar, with the worlds' first computer animated feature film, "Toy Story", the most successful animation studio in the world at the time.

All this would not have happened if he weren't fired from Apple. "Keep the faith," as they say. In the Shin Buddhist book, River of Fire, River of Water, Dr. Taitetsu Unno states, "when freed from egoistic design and calculations, life unfolds freely, in spite of the unavoidable difficulties. But a new kind of wisdom is bestowed on a person, so that he or she can negotiate through the labyrinth called life." Similarly, Dogen-zenji wrote,

To study the Buddha Dharma is

To study the self

To study the self is

To forget the self

To forget the self is

To be confirmed by ten thousand things (Other Power).



RSG EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM

Ryukoku Sogo Gakuen (RSG) held the Educational Program for International Understanding at Pacific Buddhist Academy (PBA) from August 1 - September 12.
